Meanwhile, June 30 was the last day Legend **Rick Eytcheson** served as President and General Manager of CapRadio. Rick tells us, “Tomorrow I become President Emeritus and I will continue to work (on a modified schedule) to raise money for our capital campaign. We’re raising \$15million to relocate the facilities to downtown Sacramento, move

the KXPR tower and transmitter closer in and build a larger endowment to see us through rainy days like, well, today!”

Rick describes himself as “a radio junkie as a kid.” His first radio gig, at age 26, was as a disc jockey in LA in 1976. He says, “I wasn’t a very good announcer, but I loved the business.” Thus he went into sales and sales management, then his first GM job at KOSO in Modesto in 1982. He came to Sacramento to manage KFBK/KAER in 1985 at the ripe old age of 35. In subsequent years, Rick’s had responsibility for stations in Fresno, Los Angeles, Riverside/San Bernardino, San Francisco, Santa Rosa, and now the CapRadio cluster which

includes Stockton/Modesto, Reno/Tahoe, and is about to expand to include Chico and Redding.

“I’ve always believed radio is a talent league,” Rick tells us. “The station with the best players wins. And I’m proudest of the accomplishments of the many incredibly talented people I’ve had the privilege of working alongside. **Dave Williams and Bob Nathan, Paul Robins and Phil Cowan, Kitty O’Neal, Tom Sullivan, Rush Limbaugh, Beth Ruyak, Donna Apidone and Steve Milne, Devin Yamanaka, Rob Sherwood, Don Imus, Gary Gerould, Dave Grosby and Tim Roye, David Glass, Bob Hogue, Chick Hearn and Stu Lantz, John Sebastian** and many many more.”

After 13-plus years at CapRadio, Rick says, “It’s been a great ride. I’ve put off retirement three times. Now it’s time to step aside from the day-to-day and become more of a consumer than producer.”

Speaking of **Beth Ruyak**, just as we were going to press, she announced her retirement as of July 3 to her CapRadio listeners. We’ll have more about Beth’s career in the August newsletter.


