#### Writing the Book She Wants to Read

"If there's a book that you want to read, but it hasn't been written yet, then you must write it." So advised the late Nobel Prize-winning novelist **Toni Morrison**. That advice in part motivated Valley Broadcast Legend Dana Michaels to turn what she originally envisioned as a film screenplay into a book. That is how In Your Dreams! An Unlikely Later-In-Life Love Story was born and published as an eBook and paperback in 2022. But a lot of years, and re-writes preceded that achievement. "I had the main premise of the story with some important events in it, and the ending ... but there were a lot of details between those points to come up with," according to Dana. It started as a romantic comedy, but while Dana was writing the story,

her mother became ill and passed away. "I lost my sense of humor," she says. "I hadn't written down the funny scenes and dialogue that I had thought of previously." So, the book transformed to a contemporary, later-in-life romance, "with as much humor as I could inject". The Amazon synopsis calls the book "an emotional roller coaster following an upper-class British actor's pursuit of an American who


> is *not* impressed by or attracted to him just because he's the leading man in a BBC-TV drama."

Dana decided to self-publish. "After the internet turned the world upside-down and democratized mass communications, it became easier to truly self-publish and sell eBooks on Amazon," she explains. Bookstores also began selling all book formats on their websites. A hardcover was published in 2024. An AI narrated audiobook came out this year, but Dana says, "I

can't recommend it to anyone else. I'll record it myself after I publish the sequel." With her lengthy career as a radio personality and TV booth announcer, Dana should be a real natural as an audio book narrator.

A second book, *Dream On*, is in the works but according to Dana it "has been harder to write than the first, and I dare not predict when I'll publish it. I have some great scenes in mind for the third book, but I want to finish Dream On before I start writing it"

#### **Creating Our Own Layers of History**

Our next meeting will one again be held in the Old Spaghetti Factory, 12401 Folsom Blvd., Rancho Cordova, CA 95742.

The feedback from our initial meeting was very positive. Please provide any suggestions for improvements going forward. But it appears we have a long-term location for our meetings.

Our June meeting will be about the history of

the California State Fair. Like many of you, I have many memories of working at the fair—mainly long, hot days, but it was always fun. I hope you will share your fair stories with the group.

I recently took a trip to my hometown, Chicago. I left 50 years ago and marvel at the changes. Fifty years is a long time, and many of the people I knew have passed away, and many of the buildings and monuments gone or altered. One of the great treasures of Chicago is the Art Institute and I always try to visit when I'm in town. Pierre-Auguste Renoir's *Two Sisters* is here, part of one of the greatest collections of the works of the French Impressionists in the world. There is an interesting connection to Sacramento in the story of how Chicago acquired these masterpieces, but that's a story for another day.

Also at the Institute was a special display, a selection of 58 rarely seen ancient Roman sculptures from Italy's storied Torlonia Collection. These are marble and granite statues from thousands of years ago. Some of it is funerary art. It's moving to see the images of the deceased on the tombs and the tributes their relatives paid them.

Rome is a city of ruins, in "layers like lasagna," one set of buildings built atop another. Archeologists dig down one layer at a time, revealing treasures lost for centuries. It is in this way we come to catch a glimpse of the ancient world. Here at VBL, I think we are creating the records that could last a long time and contribute to future generations' understanding of our era; we are creating our "layer" of information about the important events of our time. If our efforts will be discovered and how it will be interpreted, we can't portend. But we can try.

As for the lasagna analogy, remember we're meeting in an Italian restaurant!



#### **Stan Atkinson: 1932-2025**



There are Legends, and then there are **LEGENDS**. Our own **Stan Atkinson** was one of the few who belonged in the latter category. The *Bee* summed him up: "The man who owns Sacramento."

In a career that spanned four decades, Stan anchored the news at KCRA and KOVR, retiring in 1999. When he started out in 1957, KCRA had been on the air only two years. Everything was black-and-white, and the anchors were expected to promote sponsors' products as well as report the news. When his career ended, local TV news had gone digital.

A native of San Diego, Stan first got bitten by the news bug by writing for his high school newspaper. His first paid broadcast gig was at a radio station in Los Alamos, New Mexico.

Stan was just 25 when he began anchoring the 11:00 p.m. newscast at KCRA. The story has it that then-owner **Gene Kelly**, when first viewing Stan's on-air performance, demanded, "Who in the hell ever hired

that damn kid?!" Somehow, "that damn kid" survived and thrived.

Beyond anchoring, Stan was equally legendary for his exploits in the field, covering turbulent situations around the world. Stan was chased down by a Soviet helicopter in Afghanistan. Leftist guerillas robbed him in El Salvador, and he was shot at in Cambodia. He went undercover to report on resistance movements in Afghanistan, Angola, Cambodia and Central America. Stan filed reports from Baghdad just before Operation Desert Storm began and from Somalia as the nation collapsed into anarchy. Here at home, he landed on the Manson family's "hit list" after doing an interview with Charles Manson.

Stan had a special interest in Vietnam. He covered the beginnings of the war in the early 1960s. In 1987, he returned with former Green Beret **B.T. Collins**—the first Americans to drive through the country since the fall of Saigon. Later, he and Collins led the fundraising campaign to create the California Vietnam Veterans Memorial on the State Capitol grounds.

His many honors: three Emmy awards for reporting from Afghanistan and Somalia, the George Washington Medal for Individual Achievement from the Freedoms Foundation, the World Affairs Council Award for International Reporting, and the Albert and Mary Lasker Award for Medical Journalism. He was inducted into the Silver Circle by the San Francisco/Northern California chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences. The Sacramento Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce named him the "Sacramentan of the Year," and he received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Sacramento Regional Foundation.

Stan was a graduate of Pasadena City College and in 1967 attended Stanford University under the prestigious Ford Foundation Journalism Fellowship.

Even in retirement, Stan remained active in community affairs, lending his celebrity status to numerous charitable causes, including his own Stan Atkinson Foundation. Among many other contributions, he volunteered to be one of the first seniors to receive a Covid vaccination in hopes of proving there was nothing to fear.

Stan signed off on Sunday, May 25. He is survived by his wife, **Kristen McCann**, sons **Brad, Mike** and **Alex**, daughter **Sarah**, and 14 grandchildren. A fourth son, **Lance**, died in 1994.

Our understanding is that Stan did not want any service. If this changes, we will let everyone know.

## Martin Ashley: 1948-2025

To thousands of teens growing up in Sacramento in the late 1960s and 70s, he was simply "Wonder Rabbit," one of the legendary DJs spinning the hits on Top 40 powerhouse KROY-AM 1240. But for those working in the industry, **Martin Ashley** was also known as one of the best engineers in the business.

Interviewed in *Radio World* magazine in 2023, Martin summed up his career: "I loved radio and just wanted to be a part of it." As a child, he enjoyed tinkering with AV equipment and at age 15, he approached West Sacramento station KJAY, offering to work for free. The PD, **Rick Cimino**, advised Martin that he could make more money as a DJ than an engineer, so Martin decided to pursue both on-air work and engineering. At 17, he landed his first paying gig (92 cents an hour!) at KXOA.

The Army interrupted his radio career for two years. Martin served his country in the radio/TV section of the Fort Bliss (Texas) Public Information Office. Then it was back to Sacramento and to KROY. A fellow DJ bestowed the "Wonder Rabbit" on-air nickname after noticing how Martin was constantly hopping around the station, eagerly performing whatever tasks needed to be done: cleaning cart machines, adjusting tape recorder heads, changing the needles on the turntable tonearms.

Martin's voice was later heard nationwide as he voice-tracked for a CHR (Contemporary Hits Radio) format syndicated by Concept Productions out of Roseville. He was the chief engineer for Sacramento's Heavenly Recording Studios and the station announcer for KVIE-6 for 23 years. His last gig involved running the audio management department at the State Capitol.

Martin had other enthusiasms besides radio. He had a private pilot's license and owned a Cessna 150H. He flew voluntary medical missions for AirLifeLine, which provides free transportation for low-income children and adults needing specialized medical treatment. He purchased a retired Sacramento Fire Department engine, fixed it up, and drove it to schools and in parades. He restored a 1943 World War II Jeep and a 1966 Ford Mustang. And he formed a World War II reenactment group called the 427th Air Squadron that attended Big Band dances and regional air shows.

When news of Martin's passing became public, tributes poured in on social media. **Art Ballard** wrote, "Martin was funny, quirky, unassuming and didn't have a clue how to be mean to anyone."

Martin died on March 25 after a short battle with cancer. He is survived by his wife, **Lin**. At his request, no memorial service was held.
